IS AGAINST THE BOROUGH

VERDICT RETURNED IN FAVOR OF GALLAGHERS.

Borough of Jermyn Is Directed to Pay Them \$750—Rules for New Trial Granted in Three Suits Tried Last Week—Cases Heard in Orphans' Court—Sheriff Schadt Acknowledges Deeds—Martin Joyce, of Dunmore, Defendant in a Slender Suit for Damages.

A verdict of \$750 for the plaintiffs was returned yesterday by the jury in the case of Frank Gallagher and John Gallagher against the borough of Jermyn. Mrs. Gallagher is granted \$500 for the injuries she sustained to her leg, and her husband is allowed \$250 for the time and money he expended in caring for her.

Rules for new trials were granted yesterday in three cases tried at the present term: C. B. Wessott against Thomas C. Griffin, F. C. Pilger against the borough of Throop and Luther Keller against George W. F. Schacht.

In the case of Wessott against Griffin, the plaintiff was a tenant of the defendant and defaulting in rent to amount of \$90 was sold out at constable's sale. The sale was conducted by Deputy Constable Andrews. The plaintiff maintained that the sale specifying that it must be conducted by a sheriff, under sheriff or constable. Judge Carpenter ruled that a deputy constable might also properly conduct the sale. The jury found for the defendant, and the plaintiff is asking for a new trial alleging that this ruling of the court was erroneous.

In the case of Pilger against the borough of Throop a verdict of \$190 for the plaintiff was allowed for damages done his stock of eggs, hens and provisions by water from a blocked gutter flowing into his cellar. By the plaintiff's own testimony the damage was done in 1896, when according to trustworthy testimony the defendant was not in possession of the premises. The principal reason for asking a new trial in the case of Keller against Schacht is that the verdict was against the weight of the evidence and should have been for the defendant.

Court adjourned at 10:30 o'clock until 9 o'clock Monday morning.

In Judge Vosburg's Court.
The audit in the estate of J. E. Ryan, deceased, was continued before Judge A. A. Vosburg in the orphans' court yesterday. Claims were presented by Attorney W. A. Wilcox and E. D. Duffy and C. E. Pritchard, representing various creditors, and J. J. Davis, assistant city collector, presented some municipal liens.

Objections to many of these claims were made by M. B. Crowley, counsel representing the estate. The evidence was concluded, but the arguments of counsel will be heard next Tuesday.

Adjudication and distribution decrees were handed down by Judge Vosburg in the estates of Robert C. Gillespie and Garrett A. Van Sickle. In the former estate the fund is distributed under the intestate laws, while in the latter the provisions of the will are followed except as to the trust legacy to A. B. Simpson, which is held to be invalid for the reason that it is a bequest to charity made less than one month prior to the death of the testator, and is therefore void under the act of assembly.

Today is the time fixed for examination and final confirmation of all accounts of executors, administrators, guardians and trustees, which were returned on the first day of the term. Accountants are expected to be present with their vouchers.

New Suits Instituted.
Suit in ejectment was brought yesterday in Prothonotary Connelly's office by Ira Barber to restore possession of the property at the corner of Monroe avenue and Poplar street in the Sixth ward of Dunmore, which is now held by Charles Spritzer.

Mr. Barber claims title under purchase at a tax sale, Oct. 18, 1901. He is represented by Attorney F. W. Thayer and I. H. Burns.

Martin Joyce, a miner of Dunmore, was made defendant in a \$5000 damage suit. He is accused of injuring to the reputation of Richard J. Coleman, a neighbor, by calling him by name and charging him with attempting to steal the affections of Mrs. Coleman. P. P. Laughlin is the plaintiff's attorney.
