DID NOT GET TO THE JURY

NON-SUIT GRANTED IN THE MITCHELL CASE.

Averments of Contributory Negligence, Fellow Employee's Negligence and Failure of the Plaintiff to Prove Satisfactorily That He Was Injured in the Manner Alleged Result in the Defendant Company's Victory—Verdict for Defendant in Coal Screen Case.

When common pleas court resumed yesterday, after the Thanksgiving recess, Judge Wood took up the case of George W. Mitchell against the Pennsylvania Coal company, which was on trial all of Wednesday and after hearing the lengthy arguments from both sides, granted the defendant's motion for a non-suit, together with a rule to show cause why it should not be stricken off.

Mitchell claims he was permanently injured Dec. 2, 1898, while descending in a carriage to his work in the North Branch colliery, at Old Forge, by a piece of coal falling down the shaft and striking him on the head and side. His skull was depressed and one of his ribs injured. The company was alleged to be negligent because of the fact that half the hood was missing from the top of the carriage.

The October statistics of German trade show imports to the amount of \$72,884 tons. This is a decrease of 4,000 tons from the imports of October last year and the exports during October amounted to 2,989,981 tons, an increase of 732 over the corresponding period of 1900.

Pittsburgh is seeking control of the Milwaukee street railways. As soon as the negotiations are closed the lines in that city will be reconstructed. W. Kelsey Schuett, vice-president and general manager of the Consolidated Traction company of Pittsburg, has been in that city representing Pittsburgh and others.

President T. D. Nichols, Vice-President Adam Ruscovich and Organizer Lowell, of District No. 1, of the United Mine Workers, went to Boreas yesterday to endeavor to settle the strike at the mines of the State Line and Sullivan County railroad. The company has submitted a proposition, which is to be considered by the men in connection with the mine workers' officials.

HEARING IN ORPHANS' COURT.

At the hearing on the rule for the preliminary injunction yesterday, the plaintiff was represented by Willard, Warren and Knapp and the defendant by O'Brien and Martin and I. H. Burns.

A hearing was had yesterday before Judge A. A. Vosburg in the orphan's court in the matter of the estate of George E. Flor, deceased, in the matter of the citation upon the testamentary guardians of Ella and Daisy Chambers, to show cause why these minors should not be allowed to make choice of guardians, each of them being now over the age of fourteen. An allowance was also asked for the support and maintenance of those wards, it being alleged that their father who lives in Washington, D. C., is unable to properly care for them.

Considerable testimony was taken, and arguments were made by Clarence Valentine and Hon. E. C. Newcomb on behalf of the application, and by Hon. H. A. Knapp and A. D. Deau for the respondents. Judge Vosburg reversed his decision.

Today will be the last day of the regular session of the orphan's court, but special sessions will be held as occasion requires during the month of December.

PENN'S "BONE LIBRARY."

A Complete Collection of Skeletons of Animals Known to Science.

The Wisner institute of the University of Pennsylvania is now in possession of a "Bone Library," which is said to be the only one of its kind in existence.

The bones which make up this peculiar library include the skeletons of almost every animal known to geologists. Dr. Jayne, who is at the head of the Wisner institute, has adopted an entirely new method of classifying and arranging these bones. Instead of mounting the complete skeleton, as is commonly done, the skeleton is disarticulated and the bones are catalogued and placed in separate trays, following the order of cataloguing the bones in the university library.

By this means it is made possible to study every bone in its proper class. The collection is so complete that the evolution of any particular animal can be studied through many generations. In the same way it is possible to trace out the relationship to some allied animal.

Dr. Jayne and his assistants are continually adding to the bone collection. The latest addition received is that of the skeletons of three European apes, said to be the only ones in America.

The apes were natives of Southern Spain, having been taken over there from Algiers at a very early date. They have been carefully protected by the Spanish government, and for this reason none of them have ever before found their way to any American museum.

FOREIGN COAL ORDERS DECLINED.

Would Interfere with the Demand for Home Consumption.

Philadelphia, Nov. 29.—No more foreign orders for anthracite are to be accepted by the Philadelphia and Reading Canal and from consumption in Pennsylvania. These have become so large and so numerous in the last month that to supply them would seriously interfere with meeting the demand for home consumption. If all the recent orders were accepted by the company, it would mean the immediate shipment to foreign ports of not less than 20,000 tons.

Present low rates to European ports on outgoing vessels are principally accountable for the foreign demand. The freight to French ports now costs only \$2.27 per ton, the price formerly being at least \$4. The present rates enable the foreign consumer to obtain coal for \$6.12 a ton.

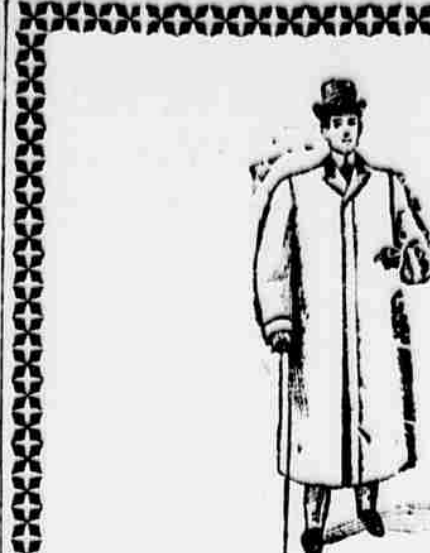

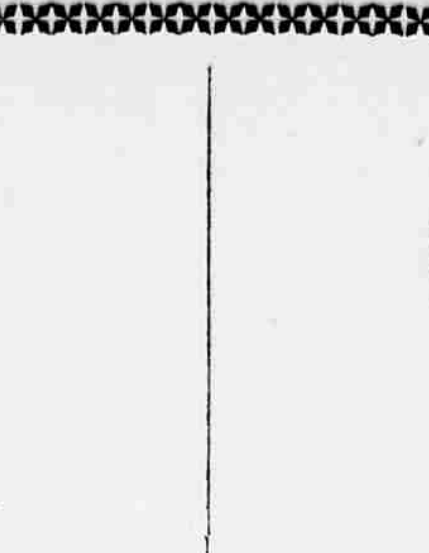
