Hill was standing on a scaffold some twenty feet from the ground, making repairs to the breaker, when the scaffold collapsed, precipitating Hill to the frozen earth.

The unfortunate man's fall was witnessed by several other workmen who immediately ran to his assistance. They found him in an unconscious condition, lying with the greatest difficulty. He was removed to his home where he suffered a severe hemorrhage.

From a thorough examination by the physicians in attendance he was found to have broken bones on the left side, it being also feared that he received internal injuries. He will probably recover.
