City Notes.

WEEK'S CLEARINGS.—The report of the week's clearings at the Scranton Hardware House association for the week ending Dec. 5, was as follows: Monday, \$106,307.52; Tuesday, \$85,496.67; Wednesday, \$226,430.35; Thursday, \$85,366.75; Friday, \$192,501.71; Saturday, \$212,314.62; Total, \$1,044,421.21. ITALIAN HAD A ROLL.—Joseph Amelotti, of Larch street, who was arrested on a warrant by Constable Hurling for refusing to pay his taxes, alleging that he had no money, was taken to the county jail, and when some time later the sum of his cost was found to contain \$65 in bills, he was compelled to pay the taxes and costs, amounting to \$300, and will sit today for Sunday Italy.

WALSH WANTS DAMAGES.—Attorney John P. Quinn has filed a bill of complaint against the Lackawanna Iron and Steel company on behalf of Joseph Walsh, of Minooka, who was struck on the head at the "Shop" in the South mill last May. Walsh's skull was fractured and the right side of his face is paralyzed and he is otherwise disabled. He asks damages in the sum of \$50,000.

BOTH SIDES FELICITOUS.

Street Car Strikers and Company Elated Over the Situation as It Exists at Present.

The street car strikers were generally elated yesterday over the action of the American Federation of Labor in endorsing their strike and pledging its fullest support. They declare now that there is no question but what they will win no matter how long the struggle may last. National President Marion and President Mitchell of the mine workers are the two men above all others, whom the strikers would seek to make the chief spokesman in hand, and the action of the executive council in making them the sub-committee to represent the federation, meets the heartfelt approval of the strikers.

The company is correspondingly elated over an expected break of considerable proportions in the ranks of the strikers. Five men, the company claims, will return to work this morning and ten others will follow suit the next day.

The hearing in the criminal libel case instituted against the strikers' executive board by ex-striker Burnell will take place this afternoon at 4 o'clock in Alderman Millar's office. The city editors and strike reporters of the local dailies have been subpoenaed to identify the alleged libelous communication as the product of the strikers' executive committee.
