Towanda, Dec. 6.—The stores are beginning to be attired in holiday attire for their window attractions.

It is now an assured fact that the Lehigh Valley company will put a new bridge across the river at this place, and in all probability will also erect a new station—a much-needed improvement.

Eugene Bennett, of Sayre, aged thirteen years, proved himself a hero in rescuing Mabel Pittston, aged sixteen years, from drowning in the Susquehanna river at that place.

The Northern Anthracite company are erecting a large breaker at Lopatcong, which is 160 feet high with a frontage of 106 feet. The coal shaft is 125 feet deep, and the working will be done by a team of engines. The breaker will be furnished with four round screens, four shakers and four sets of rollers, including all machinery. About four hundred men will be put to work and when in operation the capacity will be 1200 tons a day.
