INDUSTRIAL AND LABOR

COLLIERIES WERE IDLE BECAUSE OF LACK OF CARS.

The Washouts on the Various Roads Prevented the Movement of Cars and the Effect of This Was Felt at the Collieries Hereabouts—Diamond Mine Was Idle Because of an Accident—The Board for Today. Changes Made at the Lackawanna Station.

Nearly all of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western collieries, which were forced into idleness by the recent flood, and the shortage of cars, resumed operations yesterday, and those remaining idle will resume today.

All of the Delaware and Hudson collieries are working, and the general trend of operations has been resumed in the anthracite fields.

The Delaware, Lackawanna and Western employees will be paid before Christmas, but the same cannot be said of the employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad, who are still being paid by the Pennsylvania Railroad.
