DANIEL JAMES THE VICTIM OF A MINE ACCIDENT.

Daniel James, aged 62 years, a wellknown resident of Luzerne street, was so severely injured while at work in the Continental mines yesterday that he died shortly after being removed to

He was at work in a chamber when a fall of root occurred, crushing him beneath it. When rescued by his fellow employes, James was unconscious, An examination afterwards proved that the man's back had been broken

He is survived by the following sons and daughters: David, Daniel, John, Caradoc and Mrs. Reese Evans, of Eynon street. The funeral announcement will be made later.
