JERMYN AND MAYFIELD.

ower than any, offering to supply ights for \$65.56 per light per year. juestion arose as to the legality of the ouncil entering into a contract with a private individual, and the matter was aid over to obtain legal advice on the matter. Following is the reply of Borough Solicitor Mulholland, which Secretary Jones read:

"In regard to the right of the borough to cease taking light from the Jermyn Electric Light, Heat and Power ompany, or an individual, to furnish the borough with light. I have given the matter a very thorough investigation, and I believe I have seen all the authorities in the state on the ques-

lon. "The question of the right of the borough to cease taking light of the old company at the discretion of the borough officers is an unsettled question. There are two decisions of the Supreme court, and one of the comnonwealth, which hold in a general way that electric light companies have to exclusive right to furnish light to a borough or a city the same as water companies have to furnish water. These three cases lean strongly in favor of the right of the borough to let its contract to any company it

which one of the judges of the western countles of the state, which holds that the borough or city cannot cease at its pleasure taking light from an old company which has been furnishing : borough or city with light, and enter into a contract with a new company This last decision puts the right of electric light companies on the same evel as water companies. It is, how ever, a decision of a lower court and of course, may be appealed from and evised by the Supreme court.

"As far as giving the contract to a individual is concerned, the trouble with that would be that the individual could not have the right to use the streets for the purpose of erecting poles and stringing wires without getting a franchise from the state to do so. To get a right to use the streets authority from the state, as well as
