# **WOULD REMOVE** THE ASSESSORS

LUTHER KELLER SAID HE'D DO IT IF HE COULD.

At a Meeting of the Estimates Committee He Strongly Condemned Their Action in Appointing a Clerk Without Any Appropriation Having Been Made-Items for Clerk's Salary Were Stricken Out as Was Also an Item of \$600 for Clerk of Common Council.

The city assessors came in for some hard raps at last night's meeting of the joint estimates committee of coun-Common Councilman Luther Keller criticized them sharply for their action in appointing a clerk without any appropriation having been made, and several of the other members of the committee re-echoed his senti-

Some six months ago the assessors appointed Daniel R. Watkins as clerk n their office, no salary having been provided for such a place in the general appropriation ordinance for the present year. Mr. Watkins has done extensive work during that period and is at present engaged in compiling the assessment recently made.

In their estimate of their expenses for the coming fiscal year the assessors ask for an appropriation of \$525 to pay Clerk Watkins for the time he has already expended in their office and also for an appropriation of \$1,000 to pay his salary for the coming year. When the committee got along to a consideration of the assessors' estimate

Mr. Keller took the floor, "Let's make short work of these two items," said he, "and cut them out altogether. The assessors did enirely wrong in appointing a clerk when there was no appropriation and they know that their action is indefensible. Any official or officials who would do what the assessors have done in this particular instance should be removed and if I had the power I'd do it. These men got a raise of \$500 in their salaries a year ago and with all the leisure time they have they can well afford to do their own clerking."

passed unanimously. The item of \$600 for the salary of the clerk of the common council was stricken out, after a long argument. Messrs, Keller, Clemons and Oliver con-tended that the office is absolutely un-necessary and that the work done by the clerk could be just as well done by the assistant city clerk. The disadvantage of having the common council papers in an office separate from other city records and the fact that the clerk of the common council never has any regular hours when he can be found and his assistance procured, were dwelt

Common Councilman Joseph F. Evans argued against the striking out of the item, contending that the clerk of the common council is an indispensible offi-

When the estimate of the city clerk's moved that the salary of City Clerk Lavelle be increased from \$1,500 to \$2,000 per year. Mr. Lavelle, he declared, is the most invaluable official in the city hall and it was about time councils rewarded his long and faithful career by increasing his salary. Not a word of objection was heard, and the motion was passed unanimously, every member present seeming to find genuine pleasure in voting to do a good turn for "Martin," as he is familiarly known.

The item of \$2,500, asked by the city reasurer, was reduced to \$1,500, which s \$300 more than was appropriated for this purpose for the present fiscal year. The increase of \$300 asked for the assistant city solicitor's salary was cut off, and the item of \$720, for a stenographer for the law department, was re-

duced to \$600. SALARY OF RECORDER'S CLERK. The old question of the salary of the recorder's secretary was brought up again, Mr. Oliver moving that it be reluced from \$1,500 to \$1,200, but he

couldn't find anybody present to second his motion. The total estimated revenues for the coming fiscal year, according to Controller Howell's figures, will be \$443, 334.63, while the estimated expenditures amount to about \$21,000 more, which means that the committee will have to chop off that amount. Only \$2,600 was

cut out last night. On motion of Mr. Clemons it was decided to have Chairman Wagner appoint a sub-committee of five to prepare a plan whereby \$21,000 can be cut out and report it back to the next meeting of the committee, to be held on Tuesday night.
