# **INQUEST IN THE CALLIGHE CASE**

JURY DECIDED THAT THE ACCI-DENT WAS UNAVOIDABLE.

Coroner Saltry Conducted the Hearing in Cosgrove's Hotel Last Even-Yesterday Morning-C. T. A. U. Encampment-Coming Events of Interest-News Notes and Para-

Coroner Saltry conducted an inquest last evening in Cosgrove's hotel, on North Main avenue, to investigate the death of Emil Collighe, the unfortusate young man who was killed while at work excavating in a cellar next to the P. O. S. of A. building, on North Main avenue.  $\Lambda$  number of witnesses were exam-

ined and some of them who were working with the victim, claimed that although they did not believe the work to be absolutely safe, yet they did not consider it to be really dangerous. Contractor Aswell's driver testified to having heard Aswell tell the injured men not to go under the shell of rock, but whit till it had ben broken off. Opinions differed on the case, some witnesses claiming that it was dangerous, while others claimed it was SILTE:

One man, who had been in the excavating business for years, said that the only one who knew whether it was safe or not was the contractor who was there in charge. From the evidence submitted, a verdict was rendered to the effect that

the accident was unavoidable.




