The Increases and Decreases.

The increase this year, over last, in the police fund, is due to the increase given the police by ordinance of counlis over a year ago, and after the grip, adoption of last year's appropriation brdinance.

The appropriation for special police was increased \$25, though Chief McAndrew asked for \$25 more. The Item of \$56 has stood since the time of Chief Duggan's regime, years ago, when the police needs of the city were appreplably smaller than today.

As will be noticed, there is a separate hem of \$480 for fire hose. The purpose to keep this fund intact, for the Turchase of hose only.

In the item of repairs to streets, there an increase of \$1,500 over last year, This gives an idea of what it will cost to repair the streets after the recent oods, though this sum may not be suf-


