GIVE A REMARKABLY CLEVER ENTERTAINMENT.

One of the most novel and interesting intertainments ever given in West Scranton was that of the Kaffir boy choir at the Jackson Street Baptist church last evening, before an audience that completely taxed the seating capacity of this spacious auditorium.

Nothing like it has ever been seen in this city, and it gave the people an insight into the life and character of the natives of South Africa, as repre-sented by the children of various tribes in that far-off land, of which comparatively little is known.

The children are representatives of the Bushmen, Basutos and Zulus tribes and their names and ages are: Gert Brueda, aged 15 years; Mlien Mtsela, aged 12 years; Teyo Soga, aged 11 years, and Miljelele Misela, aged 10 venus.


