

INDICTED FOR CONSPIRACY

CHARLES F. R. M'CAULEY AND FRANK S. ELMES HELD.

They Are Charged with Endeavoring to Wring Money from the International Text Book Company—Five Divorces Granted by the Court on Saturday—Bill in Equity Filed Against M. J. Lavin, Treasurer of Olyphant Borough—Dickson Borough Squabble in Court.

A second report was presented to court Saturday by the grand jury and an order was made continuing the jury in session this week. One of the true bills returned was against Charles F. R. M'cauley, of Chicago, and Frank C. Elmes, of Harrisburg, who are charged with conspiracy to obtain money from the International Text Book Company.

Another true bill was against Tax Collector George H. Stanton, of Throop, who is charged with embezzlement. The list of true bills follows:

Five Divorces Granted. Court granted five divorces in divorce Saturday. In each instance but one, the wives were the libellants. Louise Walters was divorced from her husband, Michael Walters, because of his

alleged barbarous treatment, which caused her to leave him. Sarah Evans, who was married to John G. Evans in 1896, and who left him in 1901, secured a divorce, as did also Rachel Harvey, who was married to Joseph K. Harvey on September 4, 1893, and from whom she became separated on August 24, 1901. Catherine Beck, married to William Beck in 1898, was divorced from him. Frederick Webb, who was joined in wedlock to Isabella Webb in England, in 1881, secured a legal separation from him.

Lavin Must Answer. A bill in equity was filed Saturday against Borough Treasurer M. J. Lavin, of Olyphant, by Welles & Torrey, representing the Delaware and Hudson company. It is claimed that Lavin owes the borough \$3,278.55 and the company asks for an accounting of this sum.

A rule was granted directing Lavin to appear in court within fifteen days with an answer.

More Dickson Bother. Attorney Joseph O'Brien, representing the anti-McGarrity councilmen, of Dickson City borough, secured a rule from court yesterday, directing the members of the McGarrity faction to show cause why their seats should not be declared vacant.

The law provides that borough councilmen must organize within ten days after the date fixed for organization, and it is contended that this has not been done. The McGarrity faction elected a chairman of their own, but it is contended that this election was illegal.

Other Court Matters. A three weeks' term of common pleas court opens this morning.

The court handed down an order Saturday in the equity case of M. Friedman against R. Williams and Attorney George M. Okell, refusing to grant an injunction and dismissing the rule.

In the case of the Traders' National bank against James Neils, an opinion was handed down Saturday. The decision was in favor of the bank on all save one of the notes.

THORNTON INSURANCE CASE. Masterly Address by Attorney John T. Lenahan.

The Thornton insurance case, which has been on trial in the United States Circuit court since a week ago Thursday, will likely be given to the jury today.

Mr. Lenahan concluded his three hours' closing address at noon Saturday, when adjournment was had until 2 o'clock this afternoon. Ex-Judge Willard will reply for the plaintiff, and then Judge Archibald will deliver his charge.
