New York, March 20.—The se-called specialties still occupied the largest share of attention in the stock market today. Their movement were not quite so wide nor so feverishly erratic as yesterday, but there was still an eccentric irregularity in this portion of the market. As for the standard stocks that usually make up the bulk of the trading by reason of their large capitalization and representative character, they were neglected and sluggish, as for some time past.
