PALM SUNDAY AT THE CHURCHES

The Anniversary of Christ's Triumphant Entry into Jerusalem Observed with Special Services at St. Rose Church and at Trinity. Palms Blessed and Distributed at Former Church, and Splendid Music at the Latter.

While the spirit of the anniversary of Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem was observed in all the churches yesterday—Palm Sunday—the service at St. Rose church and Trinity were truly significant of the day.

At St. Rose church, the blessing and distribution of the Palm took place, and at Trinity church, the worshippers, besides being reminded of the lessons of Palm Sunday by the sermon and the music, on every side of them were symbols of the entry of the Saviour into the Holy city, the church being decorated throughout with palms. ...

In the Catholic church, Palm Sunday is pregnant with the feeling of Lent more than any day of the penitential season, it might be said, for it opens Holy Week, the week that is shadowed by the grief and sorrow of the tragedy of Calvary. The signs of penance and contrition were greatly multiplied yesterday, both in the prayers and in the decorations of the church and altar. ...


