THE MARKETS

New York, March 24.—Today's market made the attempt to rally from the reactionary tension that developed before the close on Saturand to resume the upward tendency which s becoming fairly general on Friday. Prices red higher this morning, but the market duthe day did not hold out the promise of early dealings, and again relapsed into a land drifting condition with the dealings tost entirely in professional hands and only more obscure stocks moving with any degree the more obscure stocks moving with any degree of energy. There was a marked demand for the Readings and an apparent attempt to shift the leadership into the coalers from the western grain leadership into the coalers from the western grain carriers whose strength last week was supposed to be due to the favorable prospects of the grain crops. But the obvious fact that selling to take profits was going on in St. Paul, showing the work of professional hands detracted from the influence of the new strength in the Readings. The renewed attendance at his office of the most prominent capitalist in the street and the return to New York from holiday excursions of other large capitalists were looked to by the more sanguine of the traders to result in a resumption of market activity, but except for the buying of the Readings no such influence was apparent. Analgamated Copper was notably active, and, with occasional rallies, was depressed on account of a fear that the Anaconda dividend to be acted on this week will not be maintained. There was an active speculation in the United States Leather stocks at advances of a point or more, accompanied by reports subsequently discredited, that the accumulated dividends due on the preferred stock were to be funded into a bond.
