

Church and Sunday-School

THE programme to be followed by the fifteenth state convention of the Pennsylvania Christian Endeavor union to be held in Pittsburgh, July 8-10, has been issued by the state officers and is as follows:

On Tuesday, July 8, at 8:30 p. m., there will be a meeting of the state executive committee, to be followed by convention prayer service at 9 o'clock. The work of the convention will open on Wednesday evening, state president, Rev. Wm. W. Yates presiding. Song service will be conducted by Perry Foster. Devotional exercises, led by Rev. L. C. Barnes, D. D., of Pittsburgh. The address of welcome will be delivered by Rev. John Wadsworth, and the response by Rev. W. W. Williamson, State Secretary. Harry W. Kollar will make his report, an address on "The Kingdom and Its Coming" will be delivered by Rev. J. H. McLaughlin, of Cleveland, Ohio; also one on "The Kingdom and My Heart," by Rev. Floyd W. Tompkins, D. D., of Philadelphia. The evening session will close with denominational resolutions.

Wednesday morning at 7:30 the quiet hour will be conducted by Rev. Arthur J. Smith, of Bicknell Hill, Long Island. The singing will be led by Mrs. G. H. Leachman, of Philadelphia. At 8:30 a school of methods will be conducted by Rev. J. F. Cowan, D. D., associate editor of Christian Endeavor World.

The Wednesday morning session will open at 9:30 o'clock with Rev. D. F. McGill, of Allegheny, presiding. The song service will be directed by Perry Foster. Devotional exercises led by Rev. J. C. Robinson, of Pittsburgh. State president, Mr. J. H. Stauff, will present his report. An address will be delivered by Rev. A. J. Tunkle, of Allegheny, and this will be followed by reports from the various districts. Rev. G. O. Yahn will speak on the "True Cause for Rejoicing."

At the Wednesday afternoon session, President Yates will preside. The quiet hour will be led by "The Kingdom and the Home." The song service will be conducted by H. C. Lincoln and devotional exercises by Rev. Dr. W. H. McMillan, of Allegheny. Address on "The Kingdom and My Heart" by Rev. D. D. Lowrey, of Harrisburg; "The Family Altar," by Rev. J. M. S. Benzer, of Spring City, Pa.; "The Lord's Money," by President Yates, led by Wadsworth; "The Quiet Hour," by Rev. Dr. Floyd W. Tompkins, of Philadelphia.

At the Wednesday evening session, Mr. J. Henry Stauff, state treasurer, presiding. Christian Endeavor union will provide. H. C. Lincoln will conduct the song service. Rev. C. L. Thurgood, of Harrisburg, will preside. The address will be "The Kingdom and My Heart," by Rev. John Bacon Shaw, D. D., of New York; "The Kingdom and My Heart," by Rev. Dr. J. T. The closing session of the convention will be presided over by the state president, Rev. William N. Yates. Perry Foster will direct the song service, and the quiet hour will be conducted by Rev. Wm. W. Yates. At 8:30 a school of methods will be conducted in mills, factories and other available places.

Officers' conference will be held on Wednesday from 4 to 5 o'clock.

buildings at Allentown, Pa. The college authorities have already secured a plot of fifty acres of ground which is a most desirable location. The subject of enlarging the college facilities was presented to the meeting by Dr. C. J. Cooper, the treasurer and financial officer of the college.

Dr. Cooper has been identified with the college for many years and he spoke of the needed improvements with such mastery and zeal that his remarks met with hearty approval on the part of the assembly. The work of rebuilding will not be immediately begun but the canvassing for the necessary funds is to be pushed with all speed. The present plans when executed will require the expenditure of at least two hundred thousand dollars.

A permanent organization of the Wilkes-Barre-Scranton district was effected and a central executive committee of canvassing the church was outlined. Similar meetings have been held in various centres of the Lutheran church and the outlook is very encouraging. The following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, Muhlenberg College at Allentown, Pa., is not only a worthy institution of learning which has and is doing much good in providing a Christian and liberal education for young men, but is the only such institution within the bounds of our Synod for the training of our native youth; and

Whereas, the present buildings and apparatus is inadequate to carry on its work properly, and its increasing enrollment urgently demands an enlargement of its facilities; and

Whereas, there is now a widespread movement on foot among our churches and various Lutheran centres to enlist the moral and financial aid of our laymen to secure the needed improvement, which movement has already resulted in the securing of a commanding and adequate site for such proposed buildings; therefore,

Resolved, That we Lutheran laymen of the Wilkes-Barre-Scranton district, called together in St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran church of Wilkes-Barre for the purpose of considering this matter, do hereby express our heartfelt confidence in Muhlenberg college as a worthy institution of higher Christian education which we recommend to the sons of our church who purpose pursuing such a course of education; and

Resolved, That we also hereby express our earnest approval of the efforts at present being made to improve and enlarge the working facilities of the college; and

Resolved, That we therefore pledge ourselves to do all in our power both personally and by active work with our fellow Lutherans and friends to furnish this worthy cause.

Golden Text—"Whoever believeth in Him shall receive remission of sins."—Ac. x:43.

Christ's coming to the world was not in vain; His mission could not fail; "He came unto His own (the Jews), but His own received Him not." It desired to honor the descendants of Abraham.

Abraham was not only bringing the Messiah into the world, but by giving through him the glad tidings of His salvation to the world. But rejected and despised, he was crucified. When He came to save and save, He revealed His faithful followers the full extent of His early ministry—"All the world."

The shape of conscience were not enough to lead Peter to discharge his duty in obedience to his commission, "Go ye into the world and preach My gospel to every creature." He was startled by God's great object lesson, appealing to his heart through eye and ear. The vision and the voice led Peter to his conviction.

He saw that Jesus was "A light to the Gentiles and the glory of Israel," and that the crucifixion was the symbol of salvation for all who would accept the Lord Jesus Christ as their personal Savior. "And I, if I be lifted up, will draw all men unto Me."

When Peter was on trial for heresy and conduct unbecoming a Jew, he told the simple story of his wonderful vision and his prompt obedience to the call of God. This blessed truth of his ministry none could deny, and the church, rejoiced that all believers could share in the salvation purchased by Jesus, the living Christ.
