Acts, xi:19-30. BY REV. J. E. GILBERT, D. D. Secretary of American Society of Religious

INTRODUCTION .- Thus far the book of Acts has been confined to a sketch of religious move-ments in great centres. Seven chapters showed what was done in Jerusalem until the death of Stephen. Phillip's work in Samaria and with the eunuch who returned to Ethiopia followed. Then the account of Paul's conversion on the way to Damascus was presented, and afterward Peter's marvelous vision at Joppa and his service for Cornelius at Caesarea. PREACHERS.—(Verses 19 and 20.).—The men who thus went out preached not because they had been trained and ordained to the sacred had been trained and ordained to the sacred office—they were Lynnen—but because they were consecrated to the cause of Christ. The infant church had not yet made clerical distinctions prominent but regarded all believers as ministers. (Matt. xxviii:18.) These lay preachers, finding asylum in the north, were of two kin:18. Some were former dwellers in Jerusalem, Jawish Some were former dwellers in Jerusalem, Jewish in their sympathies, and they naturally sought their fellow countrymen, endeavoring to win them to Christ. Others had been residents in those parts, sojourning for a time at Jerusalem, now returning home because of the persecution. These preached Jeaus to the Greciaus, that is to the Gretiles, the uncircumeised. Whether this took place prior or subsequent to Peter's visit to Cornelius, as related in our last lesson, we have no means of determining. CONVERTS.—(Verse 21.)—The preaching to Gentiles in Autioch by unordained retugees was on a larger scale than the preaching of Peter at Caesarea. In the latter case, a single man, at Caesarea. In the latter case, a single man, an officer in the Roman army and his household were brought into the church, while in the former instance a larger number accepted Christ. From this it is not to be argued that the words of Peter were less effective, and that therefore lay talent is to be preferred. But the greater gathering was due to the fact that the preachers of thought and speech were therefore well known, and to the further fact that they remained and continued their labors for a longer time, thus pressing every circumstance to advantage. And so it came to pass that a great number believed, and a church, a congregation, was formed, slowing one method by which in was formed, showing one method by which in those days Christianity was propagated. It ex-hibited the vitality and aggressiveness of the

gation at Jerusalem, being the first body of or-ganized Christians, exercised a kind of oversight ganized Christians, exercised a kind of oversight for all new societies formed, perhaps holding this as a right or duty, perhaps to maintain unity and promote efficiency. Hence Peter was sent to Samaria to supervise Phillip's work. (Acts viii;14.) So now it was deemed proper to tend one northward, stopping along the way, and coming at length to Antiech, Barnabas was chosen for this important mission. The selection is highly significant inasmuch as he was not an apostle—indicating a tendency to call others into service. What is most important, he is here, declared

exhorted to fidelity and many were saved.

SAUL.—(Verse 25 and 26.)—There is always a favorable time and mode for the instruction of a great man to his life work. Antioch was honored as the first field of the apostle to the fientiles. After his brief sojourn with the apostles in Jerusalem he fied from the enmity of the Jewa to Caesarea and thence to Tarsus (Acts ix:30). There, in his native city (Acts xai:32), he remained in obscurity, with opportunity to study the philosophy of the heathen, the literature of the Jewa and the doctrines of his new

FAMINE.-(Verses 27 to 28.)-At the end of a FAMINE.—(Verses 27 to 28.)—At the end of a year the teaching of these men, so greatly profitable to the church, was interrupted by the introduction of secular matters. Among the prophets (preachers) who came to Antioch from Jerusalem, one named Agabus (Acts xxi:10) had the ability to foretell events, as did the prophets and seers of the olden times. / Under the fillumination of the Smith Landschaff of the Smith the Spirit be predicted a world-wide famine. That does not necessarily mean that there would be a dearth of food in all countries at once, but that all countries would suffer, some per-haps more than others, the visitation being in a succession of years, first in one land, then in the other. The lesson informs us and Josephus, Dio Cassius and Tacitus confirm the statement, that this prediction was actually fulfilled in the days of Claudius, who was then the Roman emperor. In those days a famine was antiolpated with much dread, both because of the discemfort and because it was supposed to indicate the Divine displeasure. (Gen. xli:25.)

BENEVOLENCE,-(Verses 29 and 30.)-Adversity is favorable to the display of character. Any temporal mistorome is, therefore, a blessing, because by it the real condition of the heart is manifest. (Psalm xxxi:7.) The prospective famine gave occasion for the church at x:8.) Having received the spiritual things from Jerusalem they resolved to return material bene-fits. (1 Cor. ix:11.) It may have been that the famine had already reached Jerusalem, or that the mother church was poor, or that there was a plan of distribution already agreed on by which the destitute in all parts should receive aid as it was needed, out of a common store. However that may have been, the disciples at Antioch made up a fund, each contributing free-ly according to ability, and sent this by the hands of Barnahas and Saul to the Jerusalem elders. They gave of their substance and grant-

elders. They gave of their substance and granted a vacation to their beloved ministers.

REFLECTIONS.—1. Here is a commendable method of missionary work. Let all Christians wherever they go, carry the gospel with them and seek to bring other men to Jesus Christ.

2. The faithful presentation of the truth, however made, will bring forth fruit. Laymen and clergymen are alike in this—they are bearers of messages which heard will do good. 3. 
