Yesterday was another day in which the contestants in the lower half of the list did the major portion of the work. Down to twentieth place there were no changes in position. C. J.

Clark, of Peckville, takes that position away from Lee Culver, of Springville and Miss Vivian Mickle, of Scranton, takes thirty-first place from Edgar Wilson, of Scranton.

Miss Mickle and Louis Gere, of Brooklyn, are two new contestants whose names appear for the first time this morning. Both have entered the contest very recently and have not lost much time in beginning.

It will be noted that the names of R. D. Dorsey, of Scranton, and Eddie Morris, of South Scranton, which appeared at the bottom of the list yesterday morning, with one point each, have disappeared. This means that as there are more than thirty-three active contestants, the names of those who have not scored enough points to be in thirty-third place, or better will be omitted. As soon as they secure enough points to pass those on the bottom of the list their names will be published and those who are thus crowded below the limit line will have their names omitted from the table until they earn enough points to displace some one else.

There are now ten contestants who have not scored ten points. Some of time have started to work recently, but the majority have seen their names appear daily almost from the beginning without apparent effort to gain on those above them. As the newer contestants get to work it is safe to predict that those in the lower ranks of the active contestants will be forced to either work a little harder or be lost sight of.
