AN ORDINANCE
Providing for the Paving of Olive Street from Adams Avenue to Madison Avenue with Sheet Asphalt Pavement on a Concrete Base, also Providing for the Setting of Curbstones on Said Street Between the Points Named; Providing Manner of Assessing and Collecting Costs of Said improvement, and Appropriating Funds to Pay for the Same.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Select and Common Councils of the City of Scranton, and it is hereby erdained by the authority of the same. That Olive street from Adams avenue to Madison avenue be paved with the best quality sheet asphalt on a concrete base, and that curbstones be set on said street between the points above mentioned so far as the same shall be necessary, the cost of said improvement to be assessed against the abutting property according to the foot front rule. Said assessment to be payable in five annual installments. All of said work to be done under the direction of the Department of Public Works, and in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor on file in the said department. Bidders shall state price at which they will contract to keep the pavement

in repair for a period of five years, the price of repairs not to be included in price charged for laying pavements.

Sec. 2. Where new curbing is required or old curbing reset the same shall be done by the city under the contract hereinafter provided for and the cost thereof collected according to the assessment with the first installment of the assessment hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3. Upon the passage of this ordinance and the completion of the assessment for said improvements as hereinafter provided, and the cordinance and the completion of the assessment for said improvements as hereinafter provided, the Director of Public Works shall advertise for sealed proposals to do the said paving and cyrbing as provided in sections one and two of this ordinance.

Proposals shall cover the entire work and shall state separately the price for setting or resetting curbstones, the price for paving per square yard which is to include the cost of grading as shown on the profile of said improvement in the office of the department of Public Works, and the price for keeping said pavement in repair for five years.

Bidders shall enclose with each proposal the sum of one hundred dollars cash or certified check, as a guarantee to execute a contract for the work within twenty days if awarded the same. In case the bidder to whom the contract shall have been awarded falls to execute a contract for the work within twenty days from the date of award, the one hundred dollars cash or certified check, accompanying his proposal shall be forfelted to the City of Scranton. The city reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Upon the execution of the contract the contractor shall deliver to the City of Scranton, and conditioned for the faithful performance of the work.

Sec. 4. At the expiration of ten days from the passage of this ordinance, the

Sec. 4. At the expiration of ten days from the passage of this ordinance, the chief engineer of the Burcau of Engineering of the Department of Public Works, shall proceed to make the assessments for said paving against abutting properties according to the foot front rule and shall give notice to all property owners of the time and place of making such assessments as provided by law.

Sec. 5. Immediately after the completion of the said work the Chief Engineer shall file in the office of the City Treasurer, a final and correct schedule of said assessments.

Sec. 7. The commencement and completion of the work specified in this ordinance shall be the date when the work under proper contract is actually commenced and completed; and it shall be the duty of the Chief Engineer to certify to the City Treasurer and the City Solicitor the date of the commencement of the work and the date of its completion, which certificate shall remain on file for the inspection of the nublic.

Sec. 8. Immediately upon the execution of the contract for the said work, the Chief Engineer shall certify the schedule of assessments to the City Treasurer, who shall notify the owners or reputed owners by mail of the amount of their assessments and the terms of payments and such notice shall include this section of this ordinance. If either of said installments shall remain unpaid for two months after the same shall become due, the whole amount of the assessment remaining unpaid shall thereupon become due and bayable, and said unpaid assessment shall immediately be certified to the City Solicitor for collection according to law.

On the completion of the work the contractor shall be paid such sums as shall have been paid on said assessments in cash, and the balance shall continue to be a lien against said abutting property provided the contractor shall have executed the bond provided for in the third section hereof.

Sec. 11. The Recorder shall nominate and with the advice and consent of the Select Council appoint a competent practical man to inspect said work, at a com-

tical man to inspect said work at a com-pensation of two dollars and fifty cents per day, for every day necessarily em-ployed upon the work. The Department of Public Works shall keep the inspecof Public Works shall keep the inspec-tor's tine.

Sec. 12. For the purpose of defraying the cost of said naving, curbing and in-spection and incidentals pertaining to said work there is hereby appropriated the sum of twelve thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary.
