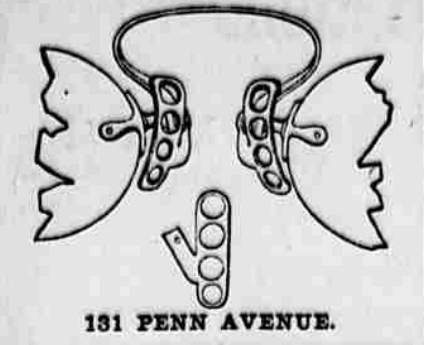

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OFFICER SHOT IN THE BREAST

CHARLES ROBINSON FOUND UNCONSCIOUS AT OLYPHANT.

Was Guarding No. 2 Colliery of the Delaware and Hudson Company. Evidence of a Struggle in the Mud Nearby—The Company Offers \$1,000 Reward for Information Leading to the Arrest and Conviction of Person Who Did the Shooting.

Charles Robinson, a young man employed as a watchman by the Delaware and Hudson company, was shot and seriously injured on Saturday night while on guard near the boiler house of No. 2 colliery, at Olyphant.

One of the other watchmen was walking near this point about 11:30 o'clock, when he heard someone moaning under a freight car. Looking closer, he discovered Robinson in an unconscious condition, with a bullet hole in his right breast.

A search of the ground near where Robinson was found, resulted in the discovery of a pair of glasses and a case. There were footprints in the mud and evidence of a struggle.

No information regarding either the nature of Robinson's wound or his condition would be given out from the Lackawanna hospital, a special order having been issued forbidding it.
