Deputy Constable Jacobs Sued for the Recovery of Money Paid Him to Discover a Man's Truant Wife—Other Notes.

Some time ago the wife of Wassill Flechner, of 311 Scranton street, eloped with another man, and as Wassill felt very bad, he commissioned Deputy Constable Charles Jacobs to hunt her up and try to persuade her to return to his fireside. Going before Alderman Noone, he signed an agreement to the effect that Jacobs was to try to find the truant wife. He was paid \$27.

Jacobs did some detective work, but was unable to locate the missing woman. He, however, kept the \$27 in payment for services rendered.

Wassill wanted his money back, claiming that he did not pay it to Jacobs for trying to find the missing woman, but he paid it with understanding that it was to be returned if the woman was not found. Jacobs took refuge behind written agreement, and refused to return the money, with the result that Wassill went before Alderman Kellow and swore out a warrant for Jacobs' arrest, on the charge of false pretenses.

At the hearing, last evening, the alderman decided that Wassill did not know enough of the English language to sign a binding agreement, and so placed Jacobs under \$300 bail to answer at court. The bail was furnished.




