FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION ANSWERED IN DETAIL.

Federal Statisticians Tell What Becomes of our Exports of Manufactures—Location of the Principal Markets for American Manufactured Goods—Over Half Go to Europe Big Foreign Trade in Farm Implements—Distribution of Exports for One Hundred Years.

The frequently asked question, "What becomes of our exports of manufactures?" is now definitely answered by the treasury bureau of statistics.

These facts are now shown by a series of tables compiled by the bureau. They show the total value of the exports of manufactures to Europe, 23 per cent.

Of the total exports of manufactures to Europe, amounting to \$15,000,000, the largest item was iron and steel manufactures, to the value of \$48,812,823.

The next items in order of magnitude being copper manufactures, \$41,454,074; oil refined or manufactured, \$40,725,548.
