### DUNMORE.

After many tedious and exasperating delays the \$5,000 worth of sewer bonds have been taken by the municipal high bidders, Dennison, Pryor & Co., of Cleveland, O. The bonds were yesterday signed by the borough officers and delivered into the custody of the First National bank. All that now stands in the way of work on the sewer being started at an early date is the possibility that the council may be to high in the proceedings, which may be instituted to restrain them from building the sewer according to present plans. The intention is only to cement a main trunk sewer from a point on East Drinker street, near Gibbons' hotel, to the terminal near the Green Ridge colliery. The manner and time of putting in the lateral is an open matter which is intended to be left to the wishes of the property owners on each street.

There is much objection to this plan as it will not insure any added healthfulness or cleanliness to the property that may be severed if sewerage from his neighbors is still to be carried in the ditches as heretofore.

It is also argued that the whole town cannot be taxed to redeem bonds, the proceeds of which were used to benefit only a small portion of the town. Of the amount now to be realized over \$1,000 has already been spent in preliminary work by the viewers, surveyors, etc.
