VERY UNUSUAL CASE.

Letters Rogatory Received from Austro-Hungary by Judge Archibald—Testimony to Be Heard.

Judge R. W. Archibald was to have taken testimony, in the form of answers to letters rogatory sent from Austro-Hungary yesterday, but postponed proceedings until September 1.

The story of the litigation dates back to the year 1885, when Hamborszki also lived in Hungary, and instituted civil proceedings against Urban for an alleged shortage in funds, which the latter had collected for a government school, and which had to be first turned over to Julius.

Judge Archibald said yesterday that this was the first case of this particular kind which he had ever tried, letters rogatory being a rather unusual method of procedure in our courts.

The letters contain specific written interrogations, one bundle of papers in the original Magyar, and the other an English translation. They were issued from the Imperial Royal Austro-Hungarian consulate, and were sent on by Vice Consul George de Grevic.

MAJOR MILLAR HONORED.

Presentation on Occasion of Twenty-fifth Anniversary of Joining Guard.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of Major W. S. Millar's enlistment in the National Guard of Pennsylvania was the occasion for a pleasant event in camp at Shenandoah on Sunday.

He was presented with a double set of gold shields by the non-commissioned officers of his staff. General Gobin made the presentation speech.

The shields are the insignia of the adjutant general's department, and are to be worn on the lapels of the coat above the keystone.

DURYEA QUIET LAST NIGHT.

Sheriff Jacobs Sends a Number of Extra Deputies.

Wilkes-Barre, Aug. 18.—Although everything was quiet at Duryea tonight Sheriff Jacobs sent out a number of deputies to the place to be in readiness should another outbreak occur at the Warkne washery.

There is a rumor tonight that coal is being mined at the Maltby colliery of the Lehigh Valley Coal company and that in a day or two the coal will be run through the breaker under the protection of a number of policemen.

The presence of so many policemen is looked upon as an indication that the company proposes to make some move very soon.

FIGHTING AT MANILA.

Native Constabulary Engages a Band of Ladronees.

Manila, Aug. 18.—The force of native constabulary engaged a band of Ladronees in a sharp fight last Saturday near Calocan, about four miles north of Manila.

The arrival of reinforcements for the constabulary won them the victory. Four members of the constabulary were killed and one was wounded. The Ladronees left three of their number dead, but two carried off their arms.

The chase of the Cavite Ladronees through the mountains of that province continues. Forces of native constabulary have had encounters with the hands of Felizardo and Montalón. Several of the Ladronees were killed or captured and a quantity of their supplies was destroyed.

FAIR VAULT OPENED.

Mrs. Oelrichs' Counsel Declines to Say Whether a Will Was Found.

New York, Aug. 18.—The Fair vault in the stock exchange was opened today under an order by Judge Gleaves, of Supreme court, in the presence of Mrs. Harman Oelrichs, sister of Charles Fair, her counsel, Colonel William Jack and Superintendent Wright, who has charge of the vaults.

It was necessary to drill into the strong box, and after the door was opened a number of papers were found which were closely examined. Mrs. Oelrichs' counsel declined to say, however, whether or not a will was found.

WORN OUT METAPHORS.

That Is What Language Is When You Analyze It.

Geo. L. Kirtledge in Harper's Magazine. The overwhelming conventionality of language, as well as its poetic quality, may be seen by taking at random almost any bit of colorless prose and studying its derivations. We shall find it a conglomerate of worn-out metaphors. We all talk poetry without knowing it, and mix our figures without scruple. Take, for instance, the phrase "arguments founded on correct derivation." Argument comes from a Latin verb that means literally "to make clear," and is ultimately referable to a root signifying "bright," "shining"—the same that we have in argent, "silver" (the bright or shining metal). Found is connected with the Latin form of the verb "to go on," and goes back to a root which means "straight." Derivation is connected with rivus, "brook," "stream," and comes from a root signifying to "flow"; to derive is literally to "flow from such and such a source." Thus in this single phrase we have a number of metaphors, foundation, straightness, and flowing. It would sound absurd to speak of "a clearing-up that has its foundation on a straightened down-flowing"; yet we say "arguments founded on correct derivation." Argument comes from a figurative character of the words, and employs them as conventional signs for plain prosaic ideas.
