CUBA LOAN DELAY EXPLAINED.

Reason for President Palma's Action, According to Washington. By Exclusive Wire from The Associated Press.

Washington, Aug. 21.-The announcement from Havana that the Cuban loan of \$35,000,000 might be held up has not been communicated officially to the United States government, but the report that such was the case was received with considerable favor by officials interested in Cuban affairs. The United States government has

given no intimation to Cuba that the proposed loan did not meet with favor, but the fact that Minister Squiers' dispatch relating to it was communicated to the treasury department and discussed among officials here as to its relation to the provisions of the Platt amendment, probably was considered by President Palma an unofficial expression that the loan was injudicious

Regarding the proposed tariff in Cuba mother unofficial intimation has been made that the changes, owing to the increases upon the products of the United States, probably would injure the prospects of reciprocity between the countries.

CHICAGO THREATENED WITH COAL FAMINE

Chicago, Aug. 21.—An immediate hard coal famine threatens Chicago. In the entire city there was not more than 50.000 tons on hand tonight and as one-half of that has already been contracted for or bought outright, the public has only 25,000 tons of the hard fuel available for purchase. Usually at this time of the year there are 300,000 tons of hard coal within the corporate limits. Heretofore unlimited quantities could be purchased at \$7.25 a ton, but today the majority of the dealers were asking \$8.50 a ton and some of them wanted \$9.
