BONDS ARE TO BE REISSUED. RECOMMENDATION MADE BY THE RECORDER. Urgent Need of the Money Prompts the Chief Executive to Advise That Instead of Endeavoring to Force Hayes & Sons to Take the Issue the City Shall Proceed to Re-Advertise the Bonds After Cancelling the Alleged Defects in the Present Ordinance.

As was foreshadowed in The Tribune, the recorder, at last night's meeting of select council, communicated a recommendation that the \$250,000 funding and improvement loan be re-advertised instead of delaying further with efforts to force Hayes & Sons to live up to their bid. The communication sets forth the recorder's reasons for making the recommendation:

Subsequently, Hayes & Sons refused to take the bonds, acting under the advice of their private counsel, Charles E. Pannocchia, esq., of Philadelphia, which said opinion was later reinforced and confirmed by the opinions of Thomas Houtler, esq., of Cleveland, and Judge Dillon, of New York.

Whether this contention is well founded or not is an open question. The opinions advanced on this issue are, at the most, only the judgments of private counsel. The matter has not been passed upon by the courts yet, as the primary purpose with us is the sale of the bonds, and this could only be effected with this house after lengthy litigation, it has been deemed advisable, after a careful review of the case in the law department and this office, to repeal the old ordinance, file of common council No. 67, 1901, and pass two new ordinances which will take care of our needs and provide for the municipal improvements previously contemplated.

WENT TO WORK AT ONCE. Council proceeded at once to comply with the recorder's recommendation. An ordinance repealing the bond issue ordinance and authorizing the destruction of the refused bonds was introduced by Mr. Vaughan, reported favorably for discussion and passed on two readings. The new bond ordinances, as required by law will be introduced in common council.
