THEY WERE MUCH AWRY NONE OF THE PROPHETS' PREDICTIONS CAME TRUE. The Strike Did Not End, There Was No Inauguration of a General Reign of Terror, and No Very General Resumption of Operations. Two Men Badly Beaten by Throop Strikers—Local Coal Company Official Points Out That Morgan Is Not Omnipotent.

Three predictions were made for yesterday, as regards the coal strike. One, made by Senator Platt, was that the strike would be ended. Another was that a reign of terror would be inaugurated. The third was that the operators would start up a large number of new collieries and add considerably to the forces at present employed.

BRUTALLY BEATEN. The two men have been working at the Pancoast mine for several weeks and have been in the habit of going to work along the old boulevard. Yesterday morning shortly before 6 o'clock they had reached a point about 200 feet south of the city line, when they were met by a gang of foreigners, who appeared running across a field from the direction of Throop. Many of these men carried clubs and guns, and Constants and Pierre were repeatedly struck over the head.

WARRANTS ISSUED. Joseph Curt, foreman at the Lackawanna, Lackawanna and Western company's Taylor mine, swore out warrants yesterday before Alderman Ruddy for the arrest of John Coombs, John Bashim, Jacob Reese, Ben Jones, David Harris and Seth Griffiths, who are charged with inciting a small-sized riot near the mine last Saturday.

GOOD-SIZED INCREASE. General Superintendent Phillips, of the Lackawanna, Lackawanna and Western company, stated that the reports from the district superintendents showed a good-sized increase in the working force of most of the collieries now in operation. General Superintendent Rose, of the Lackawanna and Hudson company, had a similar report to make. A very substantial increase, he said, had been made at the Marvino. This is the colliery at which, it was rumored Saturday and Sunday, a large number of former employees would return to work yesterday. There was a considerable increase, but not of such an extent as rumor said it would be.

Seigel said something which enraged Herring, who threw a shovelful of coal in his face. Herring was arrested for assault and battery and was held in \$200 bail by Alderman Ruddy.
