BINGHAMTON **EXHIBITION**

ATTRACTED A BIG CROWD TO STOW PARK.

It Is the Twelfth Annual Industrial Exposition-One of the Attractions of Yesterday Was the Address of Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, of Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, N. Y. There Was an Interestir - - . Show Followed in the Afternoon by

a Horse Race.

Binghamton, N. Y., Sept. 30 .- The twelfth annual exhibition of the Bing-hamton Industrial Exposition began here today at Stow park. There were more than 8,000 persons present, which beats all the records for an opening

There were many attractions to draw this big crowd out to the beautiful exposition grounds. The usual custom at exhibits of this sort is to spend the first day in preparation for those to come and have nothing but confusion and turmoil to greet those who venture out to see the sights. In departeverything in readiness for those who pay admittance to see a fair on the first day. Binghamton should be congratulated that the management of her "Big Fair" is in extremely capable hands and that each special feature is scheduled for a certain time and comes off on the second.

Among the attractions this afternoon was a speech by the eminent pulpit orator, Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, of Brooklyn, N. Y., the successor of Rev. Lyman Abbott and Henry Ward Beecher, of Plymouth church. He chose for his theme "Social Happiness and the Redemption of Mankind from Drudgery Through Tools and Machinery-Ar Expositional Address." Dr. Hillis was introduced by Rev. Dr. Waters, pastor of the First Congregational church of Binghamton. Mr. Hillis' address was mainly devoted to tracing the wonderful progress of mankind from the earliest to the present generation. SCHOOL CHILDREN.

A large number of the public school children of Binghamton were among his audience and he addressed simself in a large measure to their sens of understanding, telling in simple phrases the origin of many useful inventions and discoveries, such as Galileo's adaptation of the telescope from observing the lenses in the eye of an ex; how Eli Whitney discovered the feasibility of the cotton gin from catching a cat's method of plucking the feathers of a goose, and other incidents capable of being digested by a child's intellect. He impressed them with their good fortune in living in this great age, and compared it with the hardships of the time we are apt to refer to as "the good old days." He told his young hearers of the history of science and the function of wealth. He congratulated them all on the fact that they lived "in such a happy age and in the greatest nation, the wisest nation and the happiest nation that the world has

the happiest nation that the world has ever seen.

Dr. Hillis was escorted to the park by the Sixth battery, Light Artillery, New York Volunteers, and after he had grounds dance on his hind legs.

All the schools closed at noon today and a large number of the pupils were admitted to the grounds at reduced prices. Two sections of the grandstand were occupied by children from St. Mary's Orphan asylum and the Susquehanna Valley home. These young sters had the time of their life, and their glimpse into the big world be hind their sheltering homes will un doubtedly be a treasured memory for many a month to come.

VAUDEVILLE ACTS.

On a high platform opposite the grandstand fifteen different vaudeville acts were given during the afternoon, the programme lasting from 1.30 until 5 o'clock, and including acrobats, jugglers, equilibrists, trick and fancy bicycle riders, the bicycle whirl, slack wire performers, funmakers, etc. A baby show was given at 2.30, for

which there were twenty contestants two of them being pickaninies. The one that took first prize for being the prettiest was an auburn-haired little cherub, and his mother was presented with enough baby outfits from Binghamton storekeepers to robe and glove and cape him until long after he gets too large to use the pretty Lilliputian wardrobe.

Two horse owners got into a hot argument about the merits of their respective steeds during the afternoon and after considerable "hot air" decided to settle the question then and there. So a match race for \$100 a side was gotten up, best two in three, and the course cleared. It was a great race. Each horse broke about every forty rods, and the opposing driver slowed his nag until the fit was over. and then the race was resumed to the next standstill. INDUSTRIAL EXPOSITION.

This fair is truly called an industrial exposition. There are about 1,000 exhibitors and the entries cover a wide range. Every field it is announced, is overcrowded. Owing to the large number of exhibits it has been necessary to enlarge several of the depart. ments, among them being the poultry domestic, vegetable, fruits and live stock departments. In the poultry department nearly 3,000 birds are on display, besides many Belgian hares, ferrets, rabbits and nearly 50 varieties of
