

SENTENCE WAS A STIFF ONE

Lowry represented him, and Mr. Thomas appeared for the commonwealth. The jury returned a verdict of guilty.

O'Malley represented the defendant, and Attorney Heers appeared for the league. The jury was out at adjournment.
