



REVENUE COLLECTIONS.

A Falling Off of Nearly One-half from Last Year.


The internal revenue collections for the month of October just ended show a falling off of nearly one-half from the figures for the same month last

year. This is attributed to the taking off of the special war taxes. The total movement which touched everything of collections for the month were \$72,478.25 and for October, 1802, \$140,216.39. The itemized list is as follows; Colections on lists, \$3,240,08; beer stamps,

\$50,886; spirit stamps, \$3,889,49; cigar and cigarette stamps, \$7,750.09; tobacco stamps, \$5.678.40; special tax stamps,



Need of Enforcing Temperance Education Law Discussed.






