AN ORDINANCE providing for the cut-ting of foot walks down to grade by the owners of property abutting on the following streets in the Borough of

Moosic.

Section 1—Be ordained by the town rouncil of the Borough of Moosic, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the

council of the Borough of Moosie, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same:

That all owners of property abutting on Main street or Wyoming avenue, from Spring Brook railway to Mill creek, and on Spring Brook railway to Mill creek, and on Spring street from Butler's corners to intersection of Saxe street, and from Spring street on Saxe street to E. & W. And in case said persons shall fail or refuse to comply with the requirements of this ordinance within the time herein specified, the borough of Moosic shall cut down the said footwalks to grade, at its own proper expense, and the said borough shall file a lien for the cost of the same, with the penalty added as provided by law.
