After so considerable a reaction, involving the creation as a matter of course of a large short interest, a raily is to be expected, if only from technical causes. It was the sort interest which caused the opening spurt. The high level of prices at the opening proved inviting to the traders who have bought at the declines. It became evident also that the substantial buying which was a feature yesterday was lost to the market at the higher range of prices. For the rest of the day in consequence, there was a crumbling process which ended at the last with quite a sharp break. It is a notable fact that the heavy transfers of various stocks which are going on give rise to no further rumors of possible change of control, such as affected nearly every prominent stock a few months ago. 
