Bourke represented the company.

An Incurable Girl. Mrs. Martha John yesterday petitioned court to have her 14-year-old daughter, Minnie, committed to the House of Refuge in Philadelphia. Mrs. John, in her petition, sets forth that the girl has been at the Florence mission since February 28 last and that the officials there find it impossible to control her.
