EXCEPTIONS TO THE CHARTER

ARGUED YESTERDAY BEFORE THE THREE JUDGES.

t Is Contended That the Title St Stanislaus Polish National Church Is Calculated to Deceive People and Make Them Believe It Is a Roman Catholic Church—This Is Denied by the Applicants for the Charter. Reasons They Give for Selecting It.

Arguments were heard yesterday by the three judges on exceptions to the ncorporation of St. Stanislaus Polish National church of Scranton, Attorney W. J. Hand appeared for the char ter, and Attorney T. P. Hoban against

The latter contended that it was an effort to establish a Catholic church hat would be free from all church authority, and to deceive people it had been given the name of St. Stanislaus, a sain; canonized by the Catholic hurch. To further deceive, to this had been added the words Polish National, by both of which terms it might be mplied that it was a Roman Catholic church, since the Poles in this country isually call their Catholic church the Polish church.

As the Catholic religion is the reigion of the great majority of the peode of Poland, the word national as applied to this independent church is also misleading. In concluding his argument, Mr. Hoban said: "The founders of this new church have stolen our saints, our doctrine, our ritual, but reect our authority and our discipline.

Patron Saint of Poland.

Attorney Hand denied that the name is any way misleading. He said that St. Stanislaus is the patron saint of Poland and was regarded as a saint by the people of that country 200 years before he was canonized. Even by the Jews of Poland he is regarded as a saint, and his fame in that regard is far wider than any church. He was put to death by a Polish king whom he had upbraided for his laxity of morals, and is regarded by the Poles as a great, good God-fearing man, who had the courage to challenge iniquity in high

places. As to the words Polish and national the linking of them represented a renewal of a movement started in Poland n the sixteenth century to organize of Polish national church that would use the language of Poland in its cere-He denied that the words Polish or national, individually or collectively, would convey the idea that t was a Roman Catholic church.

As to the doctrine of the new church Mr. Hand said that any person has the right to take the doctrine of any church and by either additions or omission, or both, make this the basis of a new church. The fundamentals of all Chrisian churches are largely the same. It s in discipline they differ. Father Houdar and his associates object to the discipline of the Roman Catholic

Question at Issue.

During the arguments the judges several times intimated that the only question at issue was whether or not the name "St. Stanislaus Polish Na-tional church" was calculated to delive any person as to the nature of

Father Houdar is the pastor of the church that is applying for a charter and the head of the Polish National church, which now has branches in Priceburg, Duryen, Nantlecke and Plymouth, and has seven priests besides Father Houdar.


