ARRIVAL OF THE STREAM SHIP
HUMBOLDT.

New York, Feb. 2.
The steamer Humboldt arrived at Halifax on Sunday morning. She encountered terrible gales on her passage, and had her rudder damaged just before she was ready to report. She left Halifax on the 1st, and Convoy, on the same date, with 85 passengers, and full cargo of valuable goods. She would leave Halifax for New York this afternoon.

COMMERCIAL INTELLIGENCE.
LIVERPOOL MARKET.

Liverpool, Jan. 14.
Grain—Corn was quoted at \$1.00 per bushel, and wheat at \$1.10 per bushel. Barley was higher. Flaxseed, oats and Corn were held at an advance of 10 cents. Wheat was steady, after the advance of last week. American flour was held at 10 cents higher.

Trade in the manufacturing district was steady.

Cotton—There was an animated demand on the 21st, with sales of 7000 bales, and the 18th, 2000, including 1000 American for export.

POLITICAL INTELLIGENCE.

CONSTITUTIONAL.

Parliament is to sit on the 24th of February by the Queen in person. The present cabinet will face the difficulties without further modification.

The Royal Palace has been cleared of its contents.

Subscriptions are being made throughout England for the relief of the Amazon Indians.

The London News states that, in reference to the French affair, the British Government has given up the idea of sending an army to Frankfort and Vienna, their regret at what has occurred; and, testifying in a marked manner, the sympathy of the whole affair. There is no doubt, but the difficulty will be easily settled.

The London Times says that the Cabinet will be reorganized.

It is expected that Napoleon will shortly declare himself Emperor. Such a step cannot add to his prestige or power.

The Times says that the English pounds sterling, for the relief of the Amazon sufferers, \$500,000 will probably be raised. General Crooksey has been appointed to collect the sum in New York, urging contributions there for the same object.

FRANCE.

The President of the French has issued a decree dissolving the National Guard throughout, but it will be reorganized when the Government meets.

Thirty-six iron engines in engines building have been suspended, in consequence of the strike of the operatives, 10,000 men have been thus thrown out of employment.

CONGRESSIONAL.

Washington, Feb. 2.
Senators—Mr. Berrien, about to leave the city, has been elected from the special committee on the Florida election case.

Mr. Miller presented a petition from the Sibley family, asking for a modification of the tariff on silk goods.

Mr. Stockton presented a resolution from the New Jersey Legislature, favoring Kosciusko's doctrine, and commended a speech in opposition to the bill.

House—the bill extending the patent for Moore's self-feeding machine was ordered third reading.

Mr. Fowler asked to resolve a resolution calling on the President for information as to the cause of the recent disturbances in the West, and the proposed removal of the troops who were suspended or disbanded from March 1815 to March 1840, with the names of parties and names of all the regiments.

Opposition moved, a suspension of the rule was voted.

Legislature, Feb. 2.
The steamer Washington sank at Rock Island, in the Mississippi River, by ice. Large crowds collected, chiefly of iron and coal, which was loaded in Pittsburgh. The passengers and crew were saved.
