Station Fire.—A fire was discovered burning yesterday morning, between the hours of two and three o'clock, in the store of Mr. J. A. McLaughlin, near Wood and Market streets. The fire was promptly extinguished, and the doors were burst open, and it was ascertained that the flames had originated in the cellar, and burned through the oven door, though as yet they had done no damage to the goods.

Unfortunately a section of hose burst and the flames had time to spread to the lower and second floors of the stock. The Eagle, Dispatch and all other papers were saved, and the fire was soon put out. The Young Men's Mercantile Library, in the second story, was for a time in great danger, and it was at one time proposed to break in the windows and flood the room with water, but fortunately water cannot be used.

The goods in the cellar, consisting of cotton, mainly, suit cotton, &c., &c., were almost entirely destroyed. Some of the goods on the first story were burnt through, and the goods in the second story, and the loss will be between seven and eight thousand dollars, insured for ten thousand in the Franklin office, Philadelphia.

The building is injured to the extent of being lighted, and a thousand dollars fully insured in the same company. The fire is said to have been the work of an incendiary. After it was over it was ascertained that eight sections of hose in the ground, the door burst open, and the fire was extinguished. The loss by fire and water was considerable.
