THE ENGLISH PARLIAMENTARY ELECTIONS.—After an arduous and bitter struggle, more so indeed than any preceding election held during the present reign, the result is at length known. In our Telegraphic column yesterday morning it was stated that the total vote, 326; opposition, 301; uncertain, 2. Whether the third party members, or Liberal Conservatives, who are called, are included in the number, the result of the ministry is uncertain, the telegraphic report being exceedingly meager. It is most probable that the Liberal Conservatives will have still a small majority over the Observers. Their being in the majority, however, would be of but little avail to them, excepting on the question of free trade, since the Liberal Conservatives will not alter their position, sustain the ministry in its present conduct.

The final result of the returns from the whole of the United Kingdom must have fallen like a thunder-clap upon the Liberal party. Never was victory more confidently expected, and never did expectations seem more fully justified, than did theirs for a time after the election. But the Liberal Platform, and whether it had been adopted by those who came in, in their favor, was the real test, indicated by the returns, as far as fast as received that the Opposition had won. In many instances claimed an ultimate majority of one or more, while even the London Herald, in his estimate of the ministry, admitted that they were defeated, and at one time conceded a large majority to the opposition.

Later accounts have however, sustained the apparently well-founded conjectures of the winds. The Liberals are defeated. Still it must be admitted, that the ministry has gained only a partial victory. They have not "a majority." They are not an sufficient majority to enable them to carry out their policy to the full extent, more especially when the balance of power is in the hands of a squad of third party members, who will oppose the ministerial policy for as long as the most vital points. Such at least is the opinion of the papers brought by a preceding arrival, which is to say, that the Conservatives would have a majority of 100. So great was the reaction of opinion when the news first came, that the government began to panic, and then to retreat, until at last the ministry, admitting that they were defeated, and must yield, reluctantly, to the demands consequent upon their defeat, and from which nothing but complete success could have set them free.

Whether the result of this election will effect the overthrow of the Derby ministry, it is not means certain, although that event is confidently predicted by certain English journals. Certainly, the leaders of higher standing, great political ability, and much longer experience in the management of public affairs, than Lord Derby, have been compelled to travel, for the very cause which, it is asserted, will sustain the downfall of the Derby ministry, and to sustain a decided majority in Parliament to sustain their friends.

Already signs seem to be feeling the effects of their early victory. The last arrived from Europe brings intelligence that the Conservative party in England that many changes in the Government would take place. What they are to do not state, but the next mail will doubtless bring further particulars.

This is a sad situation in connection with the late election, that induces a cast a gloom over the prospects of revolutionaries, who have taken place in England and Ireland, and who have been extremely lamentable in their results, mainly in Limerick, where loss of life, and especially subject of soldiery, daughter of the State, has been suffered.
