

HOME MATTERS.

MARY LAW CONVENTION—A Convention will be held at Harrisburg on the 23d and 24th inst., composed of delegates from every section of Pennsylvania, for the purpose of securing the passage of the Mary Law in this State.

REUNION OF FAM.—The Directors of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company have reduced the fare from Philadelphia to Baltimore to one dollar.
