Section 10 declares that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners, having obtained the recommendation of two successive Grand Juries, and of the Court of Quarter Sessions, to credt a work-house; and if need be, to purchase ground for the streetien of such building. In seation 11, its declared that the Commissioners can, with the approach on and consent of the Court of Quarter Sessions and of the Grand Jury, alter, add to, or enlarge such public building.

The act of 1834 repeals the acts of 1705, 1707, 1767, and 1807, from which last act this one was evidently drawn and framed by the Legislature. The judicial organization of this State was different before from what it has been since-the adoption of the Constitution, three years after
