The Arctic Explorers.—Few, besides Lady Franklin, cherish a hope of Sir John's return. His party, however, has been successful, and a period sufficient of itself to ensure the destruction of a majority of his men, from the effects of exposure, privation, and want of food. Sir John, though sheltered from cold winds, has been liberally provided for as men can be who pass their lives in such a region, are not required to go through the same trials as those he has given out, and if the birds and beasts of the Arctic are as available for food as some travelers assert, he may have a supply of stores indispensable to preserve health in so inhospitable climates—the odds to prevent success, however, are great, and he has been exposed long enough. Still there is a strong hope that a possibility that Sir John Franklin is still the innocent alive and looking with the heart and eyes of hope for the day of deliverance.
