

HOME MATTERS.

RIVER FIRE.—The river is about a mile at 22 feet. The weather gives no indication of a rise.

The steamer *La Bata*, from this place, broke one of her shafts last week, near Grand river. The *La Bata* was a new boat.

CRIMES OF QUAKER CITY.—Judge McGuffey, of the Court of Common Pleas, Adams and Boggs.

In the case of M'Nister, indicted for larceny, reported in yesterday's paper, the jury could not agree.

The jury found M'Clure, the watchman, guilty of assault and battery.

He was sentenced to pay the costs.

He was with Mrs. M'Clure Frank, indomitable, pouncing upon, on each of a German named Miller. Miller swore that he saw defendant shoot his wife, and that she died in his arms, and that he saw a big cut, and that it died in an hour afterwards. Other witnesses were called to defend him, and the jury returned a verdict of guilty.

Miller was given the defense, to prove good character. The jury returned a verdict of guilty. The defendant is a Jew, and it is thought that his religion induced him to kill his death among the Jews.

Commonwealth vs. Edward M'Gaffey, indicted for burglary, on each of C. F. Porter, the first of the *Wheeling Packet*, and Peter's house, and stealing birds and bird cages therefrom. The date of the burglary was not clearly established, and the value of the property, but guilty of grand larceny.

Commonwealth vs. Washington Fisher, charged with killing Klineford, indicates that Klineford, though living at liberty, was not present during the trial. The others were found guilty, and sentenced to one month's imprisonment.

Commonwealth vs. James Henderson, indicted, highway robbery, of a man named James.

He was indicted for the robbery of the property of a man named James, in Allegheny city, some time ago. The money was afterward found in the defendant's pocket.

Commonwealth vs. Margaret Clark, indicted, larceny. The defendant, when she was discovered, was wearing the other's shawl without her permission. The property was found in her possession. The jury returned a verdict of guilty, and acquitted her.

Commonwealth vs. Jacob Heister, alias Keller, indictment, obfuscating words under false pretenses from a neighbor in Allegheny.

Commonwealth vs. Alexander Patterson, charged with killing Klineford, indicates that he had got into a quarrel with a man named Alexander Patterson, about a week ago.

The two were at a drinking house, called the "Axe," when Patterson kicked the dressed on the upper part of his coat, and then jumped on his chest. Patterson was then hit, and the two men received a blow in a court opposite Mason Hall, Fifth street.

Coroner Lowry assembled a jury, and, after examining the body, he adjured to meet this morning at nine o'clock to give the physician time to make a proper post mortem examination.

The Coroner's Inquest.—Robert Downey, a man of moderate means, who had been a friend of Patterson, of Allegheny, was shot dead by a man who is believed to have been from a man named Alexander Patterson, about a week ago.

The low stage of the river, and the approaching harvest have stopped the supplies of wheat, consequently they are able to work at half only by day.

A woman, Mrs. Jane Davis, of 111 Franklin Street, New York, was shot dead by a man named Hedges, on Sunday night, between two men named Hedges and Humphrey. Hedges shot Humphrey, and Humphrey fled, and was shot by Hedges. The man was taken before Mayor Park, where the master was to be made to pay the sum of \$100, and a sum of \$500 was held to him.

LAWRENCE.—Hugh Judge, who has been lodged in jail for some time past on a charge of assault and battery, preferred by a man named Hedges, and was engaged in the larceny of a number of small articles from P. M. Davis' auction store. Committals were made, and he is obliged against him on the full books, yesterday.

ASBURD AND BARSTWELL.—Henry McElroy, a man of 100, was shot dead by a man named Asburd and Barstwells, on Federal street, on the 19th, and was once committed to the police, but was released.

DISMEMBERED CORPSE.—Frederick Hall, arrested at 12th street, before Mayor Park, of Allentown, yesterday, for disorderly conduct, was fined \$10, and, in default of payment, was fined \$100, and held to jail to \$500.

ASBURD AND BARSTWELL.—Charles Slosser paid cash and informed the police that he had been engaged in the larceny of a number of small articles from Dr. D. L. Palmer, for assault and battery committed in Colfax town-hall on the 19th, and also once committed to the police, but was released.

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THE ALLEGHENY WEAVER.—John W. Davis, of the Weight Master, of Allegheny city, informed us that since the first of January there have been weighed 1500 loads of hay, 2500 bushels of oats, and 1500 bushels of grain.

EDWARD MCNAFFERY.—Edward McNaaffery was arrested and to three years' imprisonment in the Penitentiary, on three charges of burglary and robbery.

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
