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THE LANDMARK OF FREEDOM. SPEECH BY CHARLES SUMNER AGAINST THE REPEAL OF THE PROHIBITION OF SLAVERY IN THE TERRITORIES.

It is beyond question, that our Constitution was framed by the lovers of Human Rights, that it was animated by their divine spirit; that it was the result of a long and arduous struggle with adversity, and that it was the work of men who were not only brave but also wise.

But this argument proceeds on an assumption which cannot stand. It assumes that slavery is a natural institution, and that it is recognized by the Constitution of the United States.

It is not now what it was at the beginning. It is not now a necessary and inevitable part of our civilization, but a relic of a barbarous and cruel system.
