FIRE.—The fire establishment of Mont-

Kirk & Irvin.—Confined street, between First

and Second, was entirely consumed on Sunday

night, by a single vehicle.

The fire originated in a building attached

to the warehouse, which was so difficult an access

that the flames communicated to the main build-

ing, before it could be thrown.

The building was surrounded by fence

and a detachment of U. S. troops were quartered

in the City Hall.

The fire was extinguished by the Boston

Company, sufficient to cover the loss

of \$4,000, on which the insurance is to be about

the Fireman's Insurance Office.

The furniture was saved. The heaviest loss

was suffered by the wharfmen, to whom

the establishment belonged, and on which there

was no insurance.

For some time fans were entertained at the

firehouse, but, owing to the

determined efforts of the firemen to preserve

the stock in Mr. J. Williams' clothing

store, adjoining was much injured by water.

Mr. Williams, who had been two doors

below the old location, will be ready

to carry on their business in a short time

after the progress of the fire, when alarm

was first given.

Printed Circulars were left, in every Church

and Tabernacle, in the vicinity, calling
