Who Can Vote in Kansas?
Will the Federal Executive, Judiciary and Government permit emigrants from abroad to vote in the new Territories? The people generally say yes, that since the re-election of the Clay-Whig government, right has been given to the slaves. What good purpose would be accomplished, were such counsels to prevail? Would it stop the South from carrying on the schemes of further slavery propagation and aggrandizement known to be at hand? And is it further enacted, that every free white male inhabitant above the age of twenty-one years, who shall be an elector in the slave States, for the election of members of the National Legislature hereinafter prescribed, shall be entitled to vote at the first election, and shall be eligible to vote at each subsequent election, for the same term of office, and for the same number of years? And shall the slaves be entitled to vote? We have not fully studied the infamous Nebraska Bill, with its subtle provisions and devilish ingenuous reservations. Here is a section worthy of the closest attention.

The New York Evening Post says that by this provision every one may vote at the first election but after the first election, the legislature prescribes the qualifications of voters, with a proviso that prevents them from doing it, and limits them to the qualifications prescribed by Congress.

These qualifications are citizenship, natural or acquired, and an oath to support the constitution and the Union.

The declaration of intention referred to, is that mentioned in the naturalization acts, and the oath to support the constitution is that taken at the end of five years' residence after a declaration of intention. Now but citizens—those who are born in the country, or by five years' naturalization, have become citizens—swear to the constitution. The judges who will be appointed will have no right to hold, and exclude all others, and from the polls.

But the most insidious provision in this section, and the most intolerable provision in the whole bill, is that which makes it and the constitution of equal sanctity; which compels every man who presents himself at the polls to vote, or as a candidate for office, to swear that he will support the National Bank; and which enables the slaveholders to propagate their abominable system of slavery, in the South, before they have even got a foothold in the North.

The operation of this qualification will be to exclude from the polls and from office in the territories nearly every man who goes there from the free States. It will disfranchise nearly every member of every emigrant association that has yet been formed, and place the entire political power of the territory in the hands of slaveholders or slavery propagandists, for no others will or can take the oath required by the terms of the bill.

It will also exclude from the polls and from office for five years, every foreigner who may reach the territory after the first election day.

As the great bulk of the future settlers of Nebraska will be foreigners and emigrants from the free States, it is obvious that so far from governing themselves, the inhabitants of the territory will have comparatively nothing to do but to let the slaveholders do what they will. Such is the character of the bill which Senator Douglas informed the brass band, whom he addressed the other night at the St. Nicholas, was based upon the action of the people to govern themselves.

The above, from the New York Evening Post, will startle those who have not yet forgotten the depths of the deception of Pierce, Douglass & Co., under the leadership of the slave-breeding oligarchy. The Pittsburgh Post almost daily praises the Nebraska Law as the very essence and pivot of Democracy, and in laborious editorials strives to show that Slavery cannot enter the new territories.
