the present law; it now applies only to minors under sixteen years, and is a nullity. If such a law as we sak be passed and enforced, it would put at rest the whole dispute between Capital being so large a proportion of minors employed in our factories, it would be impossible to keep those factories in operation for twelve hours—

the adults would of necessity cease labor with he minors.

The speaker said the working classes had from time to time petitioned for such a law but a handful of men had defeated it. This is hamiliating, indeed. A moneyed minority tramples on the rights of the vast majority. He then read the law now before the legislature. It provides that no male or female operative under 21 years shall be employed in any cotton, woolen or silk factory, &c., more than 10 hours a day or 60 hours a week. A penalty of not less than \$60 nor more than \$100 is attached. The bill was introduced by Mr. Lyle, of Manayunk.

He then 'reviewed the great objection that is brought against the law, viz: that the Pennsylvania manufacturer could not compete with the manufacturers in other States. It is a fact that every State in the Union has made some provision by legislative enactment for regulating the time of labor. Twelve years ago, New Hampshire legislated to protect minors. State after State does the operative work as many hours as nine defeated.

If Pennsylvania would now pass the ten hour law, there is no doubt the other States would follow. What then becomes of the objection referred to? A single fact will show its absurdity. Pennsylvania manufacturers were never in as bad a condition as now, and yet the operatives of all the Eastern States work less time than those of this
