But locasionally a story of thrilling interest is snatched from the lingering records of the rad man. The story I am about to relate, I received from an old Indian pilot of the Allegheny. It was many years ago, when that stern old chief, Complanter, whose remains now repose in significant the story of the complanter. Cornplanter, (whose remains now repose in a lence and loadliness on the banks of that beat tone and remembers on the cause of the bright tone river he loved so well), was in his glory. His tribe roamed over the dense and unbroken forests along its banks, fearless, manufested and free.

His people were hostile to the whites, and never lost any opportunity to lied ambush and seize the lonely voyager as be descended the river, and consign him to the stake and the torture. But the watchful, shrewd, and deadly fee of Cornplanter and the whole "tawny race" was the indomitable and fearless "Captain Samuel Brady. This veteral pioneer and Indian hunter was one of those noble specimens of the hardy foresters who plunged fearlessly into the intermidable forests that then overspread so large a portion of the Western States.

Like Daniel Boone, Lewis Wetzel, Simon Kenton, and others, who made Indian hunting a pastime, his deadly bate of the Indian, and his burning passion for hunting them down, amount-

burning passion for hunting them down, amounted to a monomania. This batted was in consequence of the wrongs they had inflicted upon his family—his father, Captain John Brady, and his family—his father, Captain John Brady, and his brother having fallen victims to the tomahawk and scalping knife.

The scene of the present story is at a place known to boatmen and raftmen as "Brady's Bond," and where now the noise and bustle of a mew manufacturing town called the "Grady that the property was not discovered and no prosecution was entered.


