WISCONSIN AND FARNUM.—At this is the season of the year when considerable whitewashing is performed, and as we have been inquired of for a good whitewash, we will give you a receipt in a former volume, we present it again, knowing that a good story is never too worse to be twice told. Put into a basin of cold water, and slake it by pouring over it boiling water sufficient to make it boil; then strain it, and add salt, and add five lbs. of soap. Dissolve it in water, and add two pounds of sulphate of lime and one of common salt, which is to be added to the soap solution. Add whitewash to the solution on the woodwork. Add sufficient water to bring it to the consistency of thick whitewash. To make the above wash of a pleasant color, add 4 lbs. the number, 1 lb. Indian red, and 1 lb. lampblack. For gray or stone color, add 4 lbs. the number, and 2 lbs. lampblack. For white wash, add 4 lbs. the number, whitewash, and it will be found much more durable than common whitewash.—Sister America.
