

THE DISSENTS AT BRYANT COLLEGE.—We gave to our readers some time since an account of the disturbance at Bryant (Va.) College, growing out of the question of the Slavery Question. The H. P. Tribune of Monday contains a statement more in detail signed by ten of the students who withdrew at that time, from which we take some facts as follows:

The college session commenced Oct. 1 with 160 students, of whom about 100 were from the South and the rest from the North. Of the whole lot, Mr. Kimmons of Illinois had been there two-and-a-half years. Mr. Burns of Canada West, one year, and the remaining eight graduated at the beginning of the session.

The Southern students, it seems, had regularly been in the habit of attending and discussing the subject of slavery, and therefore it has not been against college regulations. Occasionally, also, the Northern students would refer to the same subjects and instances are mentioned of their having done so, without provoking special comment.

On the morning of Oct. 29 the President's lecture on Sacred History was upon Gen. A. V. in which, after a commendable peroration, he spoke of the South being compelled by the unkindness of her masters to become a fugitive, saying that many Southern men of the present day would have held her name in reverence, but as she had changed, and added: "Gentlemen, however these relations come into existence, when once established, they are not to be rashly and violently broken. They are not to be broken, but to be maintained until they are broken by the hands of God."

On the evening of Nov. 5 the Northampton Society held its anniversary, and was addressed by Professor Franklin and Mr. Allen, a student from Kentucky. The President and nearly the entire faculty honored the occasion with their presence. Mr. A.'s subject was Abolitionism and Negro-Slavery, and his speech was a tirade of abuse against Northern sin and privilege, and it was received with deafening cheers. The Faculty did not then announce to Mr. A., nor to the college, that such agitation of the slavery question was against the rules and interests of the school.

All these facts go to show that slavery, up to this time, was a subject of discussion in the College, both by the Faculty and Southern students, and it was only when a Northern student returned to speak as he did with his colleagues from the other side of the line, that they became intolerant of discussion. So long as they had a virtual monopoly of it, it was all right.

On Sunday evening, November 11, Mr. Burns, a student from Canada, completed the pupil, on a subject announced by the President in the morning. The great majority of the Faculty on that day he was waited on by one of the College officials and requested to confine himself to "religious liberty"; but he replied that he preferred to treat the question in the broadest sense, and would go to the end. A large congregation assembled, and when, in the most respectful language, he referred to West India Emancipation, the Southern students raised a tremendous noise, by hissing and shouting. Failing to silence them, they withdrew to the outside, where they stood the hour, broke the windows, and ranged a plot to burn Mr. Burns and his wife.
