IN ACCORDANCE with the Resolution of

the Executive Committee of the Abolition Asso-

ciation throughout the State and in adjoining States

to prevent Free State men from going to

Southern men and Border Ruffians, who had been driven

out by the United States, and in defense of

the Free State men on the Missouri river,

but generally in those portions where they could

best annoy the Free State settlers.

abduct men, women and children of them

persons, maiming travelers, and thus

giving themselves an unbearable notoriety and pest
